The new year has taken off in a big way at BVMI. Very soon, we'll be staffed to open our doors on Saturdays. Patients who work full time during the week will find it easier to balance BVMI visits with the many other demands life brings.

We've made good strides toward our Social Determinants of Health (SDoH) initiative. A Case Manager has been hired. She will be designing a plan to help our patients access resources to meet their essential needs. This process will be ongoing as we learn more about how backgrounds, behaviors and abilities affect a patient's overall healthcare needs.

BVMI's Prevent Diabetes Program (PDP) welcomed three new cohorts in January, including two Spanish-speaking groups. We've recruited more volunteers to help deliver the PDP sessions that support these patients. One cohort from 2019 is still in full swing and will "graduate" in May. Positive lifestyle changes are really catching on with our PDP participants!

Our Korean Healthcare Program (KHP) keeps growing, with 85 patients to date. We thank everyone who is making the program succeed. We recently hired a dedicated Korean patient navigator to help us to better meet the needs of patients in our Korean communities.

As always, BVMI needs more amazing volunteers. We think you'll be inspired by the ones profiled in this issue. Perhaps you or someone you know would like to join them!

Five is a meaningful number for family physician Dr. Karen Latimer. She's a mother of five and a five-year volunteer at BVMI. "I'd been on a five-year hiatus from my NY medical practice after having twins, and I missed taking care of patients," said Dr. Latimer. "I heard about BVMI and met with Dr. De Simone. I learned I'd also need an NJ medical license to volunteer. It took time and patience. A year later I was back.

"Here at BVMI, I have the gift of time with my patients. Asking the right questions and listening to the answers is the key to great primary care," said Dr. Latimer. Case in point: A young single mom who worked from home said she didn't feel like herself lately. Everyone thought she had postpartum depression. She was fatigued, on edge, and her hands ached. To get to know her better, Dr. Latimer asked, "What do you do for fun?" "Hiking" was the reply. Dr. Latimer ordered a test for Lyme Disease. After treatment, the patient was back to her old self!

#### Alexandre S. Ackad, MD and Mohannad "Mark" Anbarserri, MD - BOTTOM

There are many ways to learn and many ways to serve. Two doctors at BVMI have found a way to combine it all. Drs. Alexandre Ackad and Mohannad Anbarserri are at different places on their career paths, but of a single mind at BVMI.

Dr. Ackad, former Chief of Nephrology at Hackensack University Medical Center, has volunteered at BVMI for three years. "It keeps my skills sharp and my mind active in ways beyond golf," he shared. "I also enjoy teaching, especially as a mentor to Mohannad, who is my scribe at BVMI. He meets with me after I see patients, to document information for our records."

Mohannad, who also translates for patients of Arabic descent, is in the process of applying to a three-year family medicine program for his residency. He wants to serve people who don't have affordable options for medical care. He found BVMI while searching for a way to help a medically-uninsured coworker. She had a positive experience at BVMI, and he decided to volunteer.

"Dr. Ackad and I enjoy a very collegial relationship," said Mohannad. Dr. Ackad added, "I hope that someday Dr. Anbarserri becomes a specialist in nephrology too!"

### Evelyn (Heeyoung) Kim - TOP LEFT

Evelyn Kim works hard. As a member of the Army Reserve with specialized training, she services all the medical equipment for her unit and sometimes others. She's also finishing up coursework that

will allow her to apply to pharmacy school and someday become a U.S. Army Pharmacist.

In her not-so-spare time, Evelyn volunteers at BVMI. "I came on board when the Korean Healthcare Program (KHP) started," she said. "First I translated community outreach materials. Now I conduct eligibility interviews and serve as a Korean interpreter. I'm one of the first people applicants see when they come in for an interview, and I want them to feel welcome and safe.

"Having grown up in Bergen County, I know there are people who've had to go without healthcare for years. At BVMI, I can return some of the caring I've received in this community. When a prospective patient thanks me, I know I'm truly helping. I'm glad to see how much the KHP has grown!"

#### David Duarte - TOP CENTER

Paying it forward is important to David Duarte. He came to the U.S. from El Salvador at age 15. "I didn't speak much English then," said David. Now he's completed the first half of his studies at Fairleigh Dickinson University. "I learned about BVMI online about a year ago, and thought joining such an inspiring organization would be a great idea," said David. "I started as a

scheduler. Now, as an interpreter, I can be a voice for some of the patients. I've been in their shoes, so their smiles always warm my heart.

"BVMI is a life-changing experience for patients and volunteers. I give a small amount of time to help a big cause, and I'm grateful to be part of it. If you're thinking about volunteering here, just come and see us in action. You won't need anyone to convince you!"

# Ask Elaine

BVMI's Volunteer Manager Elaine Posner "gets it" when it comes to recruiting the right people. "I've volunteered at my children's schools, for charitable walks, at a nursing home, and even helped someone with a hoarding issue," said Elaine. "It's important for every volunteer to meet a real need."

Elaine learned about BVMI from a newspaper article and volunteered to spread the word. As awareness of BVMI grew, potential volunteers kept coming. Elaine began recruiting and placing them for us. That led to a staff position, which also includes training volunteers, managing assignments and scheduling.

"I try to learn more about each volunteer," said Elaine. "A person needs to feel useful and appreciated, but not overburdened. A question I answer is, "How does what I do here fit into the big picture?" BVMI volunteers include young people, career people, empty nesters and retirees. They're all here because they believe everyone should have quality healthcare."

## **COMING TO BVMI:**

## Case Management

Taking patient care to the next level is a never-ending goal at BVMI. Finding out what makes patients "tick" might start with a stethoscope and other medical screenings, but we need to know more. Can they afford the basics, such as food and medication? What types of stress are they under? Do they have a support network? Are childcare needs being met? Is lack of transportation a problem? Can they fulfill their own responsibilities toward better health?

These factors and more comprise a patient's Social Determinants of Health (SDoH). As defined by the World Health Organization, SDoH are "the conditions in which people are born, grow, live, work and age." Researchers believe these conditions play a much larger role in life expectancy, quality of life, and health outcomes than medical care itself.

Every day at BVMI, we listen carefully to what patients have to say, and we ask important guestions. It helps us, and it helps them. We know we can make a bigger impact if we understand a person's past and present.

Here's one example: A patient of ours confided that she was severely depressed. Trying to care for her children while in an abusive relationship had even left her with suicidal thoughts. Our team members connected

her with multiple resources to meet her needs. She was able to leave the relationship and establish a happier, more stable living situation.

The ability to focus on more patients in this way is key. That's why we are pleased to welcome a new team member, Rosa Flores-Campos, MSW, Case Manager. She will screen patients to learn more about their needs and match them with the right resources. Working with everyone from BVMI's medical team to social workers to front desk staff, Rosa can play an important role in helping our patients achieve better health no matter what they've had to face so far.

Dr. Herbert Cole, a pediatrician by training, was a dedicated volunteer physician at BVMI from its early days. In his role here as a referral coordinator, he tirelessly and successfully advocated for many patients who needed care beyond our clinic doors. Dr. Cole passed away in October 2019 at the age of 91, and we miss him dearly. But the Cole family connection continues. Dr. Cole's children, Dr. Andrew Cole and Liz Cole, and his grandson Ethan Kahn have seen to that — as volunteers, donors, and true believers in BVMI's mission.

"Dad requested that, upon his passing, our family make a gift to BVMI through our Donor-Advised Fund," said Liz. "He also named BVMI as one of his two top charities for people who wished to give in his memory. My brother and I have written dozens of thank you notes since then. Dad was a modest man, but he would deeply appreciate people remembering him in this way."

"We are dedicating some of the memorial donations to hire a third medical director, as we continue to expand," said Amanda Missey,

President/CEO. "Another way that Dr. Cole will be remembered is through the exam room that BVMI has proudly named for him."

Liz shares her father's philosophy of doing for others as a BVMI volunteer. She trains our medical professionals in the use of our electronic medical records system; locates medical reports from non-BVMI specialists who treat our patients on a referral basis; and, helps with preparing applications to drug companies on behalf of patients who can't afford vital medicines such as insulin.

Adding yet another generation to the mix is Dr. Cole's grandson Ethan, a high school senior. He spent time at BVMI this past summer, helping Volunteer Manager Elaine Posner with several tasks. "I'm interested in the healthcare field," said Ethan. "Volunteering at BVMI made me aware of the challenges people face when they can't afford health insurance. It got me thinking that maybe someday I can help deliver healthcare and change policies that improve access for everyone."

Dr. Cole's influence on his own family and his BVMI family has been his most special gift of all. Thank you, Cole family, for all you continue to do for BVMI.
